in the late 1930s the federal writers project of the works progress administration embarked upon a project to interview 100 former american slaves the result of that

unique undertaking is this collection of authentic firsthand accounts documenting the lives of men and women once held in bondage in the antebellum south in candid often blunt narratives elderly former slaves recall what it was like to wake before sunrise and work until dark enduring whippings branding and separations from one's spouse and children suffer the horrors of slave auctions and countless other indignities and finally to witness the arrival of northern troops and experience the first days of ambiguous freedom included here are vivid descriptions of good masters and bad ones and treatment that ran the gamut from indulgent and benevolent supervision to the harshest exploitation and cruelty these and many other unforgettable sometimes unspeakable aspects of slave life are recalled in simple often poignant language that brings home with dramatic impact the true nature of slavery accompanied by 32 starkly compelling photographs the text includes a new preface and additional essay by Norman R. Yetman a specialist in American studies a valuable resource for students and scholars of African American history this thoroughly engrossing book will be of great interest as well to general readers read less

Booker T. Washington grew up as a slave child during the Civil War his autobiography describes the difficulties and obstacles he overcame to get an education and his work helping Black people and other disadvantaged minorities learn useful marketable skills to elevate themselves as a race up from slavery chronicles more than forty years of Washington's life from slave to schoolmaster to the face of southern race relations America in the 1880s and 1890s was an intense time of hostility towards African American communities when Washington began his writing and public speaking he was fighting the notion that African Americans were inherently stupid and incapable of civilization Washington's primary goal was to impress upon the audience the possibility of progress without inviting violence from the mob the book inspired a 2011 seven-part documentary about Black slavery in America this cloth-bound book includes a Victorian-inspired dust jacket and is limited to 100 copies

This volume aims to show how southerners have faced their post and constructed a self the essays in this volume explore the different personal narratives and strategies southern authors have employed to channel the autobiographical impulse and give artistic expression to their anxieties traumas and revelations as well as their relationship with the region with the discussion of different types of memoirs this volume reflects not only the transformation that this sub-genre has undergone since the 1990s boom but also its flexibility as a popular form of life writing

In Uplift Cinema Allyson Nadia Field recovers the significant yet forgotten legacy of African American filmmaking in the 1910s like the racial uplift project this cinema emphasized economic self-sufficiency education and respectability as the keys to African American progress Field discusses films made at the Tuskegee and Hampton institutes to promote education as well as the controversial New Era which was an antiracist response to D. W. Griffith's *The Birth of a Nation* she also shows how Black filmmakers in New York and Chicago engaged with uplift through the promotion of

black modernity uplift cinema developed not just as a response to onscreen racism but constituted an original engagement with the new medium that has had a deep and lasting significance for african american cinema although none of these films survived field s examination of archival film ephemera presents a method for studying lost films that opens up new frontiers for exploring early film culture

seventh day adventists and the civil rights movement is the first in depth study of the denomination s participation in civil rights politics it considers the extent to which the denomination s theology influenced how its members responded this book explores why a brave few adventists became social and political activists and why a majority of the faithful eschewed the movement samuel g london jr provides a clear yet critical understanding of the history and theology of the seventh day adventist church while highlighting the contributions of its members to political reform community awareness the example of early adventist pioneers liberationist interpretations of the bible as well as various intellectual and theological justifications motivated the civil rights activities of some adventists for those who participated in the civil rights movement these factors superseded the conservative ideology and theology that came to dominate the church after the passing of its founders covering the end of the 1800s through the 1970s the book discusses how christian fundamentalism the curse of ham the philosophy of booker t washington pragmatism the aversion to ecumenism and the social gospel belief in the separation of church and state and american individualism converged to impact adventist sociopolitical thought
